



Viewing Rubrics- for Students

Instructors will often provide rubrics to communicate their expectations for an assessment and to provide feedback. Rubrics can be added to an assignment or a discussion topic. This document will summarize how to view a rubric before submitting an assessment, and how to review feedback after an assessment has been marked.

Before Submitting an Assessment

1. Begin by opening the assignment or discussion topic.
 - a. Assignments can be found by clicking Assessments > Assignments from the top navigation bar.
 - b. Discussion Topics can be found by clicking Discussions from the top navigation bar.
2. If you have opened an assignment, any attached rubrics will be visible at the top of the page, as shown below.
